Sisters and Brothers, I know there's plenty to worry about these days, and that some of those worries originate right here in our congregation. Let us commit ourselves not to what might go wrong, but rather to prayer and action towards making things right.

Updates from the Annual Conference:

Kelly and I thank the congregation for allowing us to be the GCOB delegates at the annual conference. Worshiping with brethren from all over the world is always a powerful experience. For those of you who do not know what an annual conference is, the annual conference is the only way to ensure our congregation has a say in decisions that affect the whole church. The annual conference delegate body is one of the most important—if not the highest—decision—making level in the Church of the Brethren. Each congregation may play a vital part in the annual conference by sending a delegate or delegates. Below is a summary of the actions taken by the delegate body.

UB 1. Query – Standing with People of Color

Action of the 2023 Annual Conference: Annual Conference adopted the Standing Committee recommendation to extend the term of the assignment of the Standing with People of Color committee by one additional year to 2025.

New Business Items

NB 1. Request for an Annual Conference Study on Calling Denominational Leadership Action of the 2023 Annual Conference: Annual Conference adopted the Standing Committee recommendation that the concerns of New Business #1 'Request for an Annual Conference Study on Calling Denominational Leadership' be accepted and elected three people to form the study committee.

The committee is encouraged to consult with current members of the Nominating Committee and others who have had experience with the nomination process. In subsequent action, Annual Conference elected Eric Bishop, Erika Clary, and Emmett Witkovsky-Eldred to serve as members of this study committee.

NB 2. Recommendation regarding Nominations from the Floor of Annual Conference Action of the 2023 Annual Conference: Annual Conference adopted the Standing Committee recommendation that the proposed change in Conference Rule #12 concerning nominations from the floor be adopted. One amendment, in two parts, affecting three areas of the text of the document will be incorporated in the minutes.

The recommendation was adopted by more than a two-thirds vote as a change in polity.

NB 3. 2023 Guidelines for Continuing Education

Action of the 2023 Annual Conference: Annual Conference adopted the Standing Committee recommendation that the proposed 2023 Guidelines for Continuing Education be adopted. The guidelines were adopted by more than a two-thirds vote as a change in polity.

NB 4. Restated and Amended Articles of Organization for Eder Financial

Action of the 2023 Annual Conference: Annual Conference adopted the Standing Committee recommendation that the Restated and Amended Articles of Organization for Eder Financial be adopted.

The restated and amended articles were adopted by more than a two-thirds vote as a change in polity.

NB 5. Recommended Cost of Living Adjustment to the Minimum Cash Salary Table for Pastors

Action of the 2023 Annual Conference: Annual Conference adopted the Standing Committee recommendation that the proposed 5.3% cost of living adjustment to the Minimum Cash Salary Table for Pastors be adopted.

NB 6. Resolution – With Actions and in Truth: A Lament of the Doctrine of Discovery Action of the 2023 Annual Conference: Annual Conference adopted Standing Committee's recommendation that the Resolution – With Actions and in Truth: A Lament of the Doctrine of Discovery be adopted with two amendments incorporated in the final resolution. The following text from Page 181, Lines 17-30 incorporates the amendments to the text in the 2023 Annual Conference booklet:

Recommendations

That the Church of the Brethren commit to ongoing advocacy, dialogue, education, and relationship-building regarding rights of Indigenous peoples. That invitations be extended to facilitators of the Blanket Exercise from Kairos Canada to host sessions for Church of the Brethren leadership and staff and to present at relevant church events, such as Annual Conference. That attendance of Church of the Brethren leaders and staff at the National Native American Boarding School Healing Coalition's conference be funded. Attendees may include Dine' members from the community in Lybrook, N.M., Intercultural Ministries staff, and other denominational leaders. That the Church of the Brethren consult with Indigenous organizations and tribes to develop opportunities for congregations, districts, and the denomination to consider some form of reparation following the leadership of Native nations or organizations.

Updates from the Board:

The board met recently and achieved the following three agenda items.

The first is extending the Interim Pastor's contract for September 1st through December 31st. Since we are entering the season of advent and there are more expectations placed on pastors, Pastor Greg will be working 60% of the time (his previous contract was 50%).

Second, was to ask the trustees to explore renting the Parsonage until it is needed for a full-time pastor. The trustees have found a tenant to accept a monthly lease from September through December.

Finally, the board is exploring the concept of anchor ministry. This is a model that used to be used by the Brethren and is currently being practiced with our district leadership. The idea is that there is an anchor (lead pastor) that works with various people to help fulfill the needs within the church. Maybe it's visitation or outreach.

Our next meeting will be on October 25th and we will be working on the budget to present at the November 2nd congregational business meeting.

Finance Commission Update: A Call to Support Our Church Community

As we approach the end of another year and prepare for the blessings and opportunities that 2024 will bring, it is our privilege and responsibility to provide an update on our financial stewardship as a congregation. The Finance Commission has been diligently working on finalizing the budget for the upcoming 2024 calendar year, but before we dive into the future, let's take a moment to review where we stand in 2023.

Year-to-Date Financial Overview (January - September 2023)

Our church has always been a place of warmth, love, and unwavering faith, but it's no secret that maintaining our church community and facilities comes with a financial commitment. As of September 2023, here's a snapshot of our financial status:

Year-to-Date Giving: Our generous congregation has contributed \$151,624.39, which represents 62.14% of the 2023 giving budget. We are deeply grateful for your continued support and unwavering dedication to our church.

Year-to-Date Expenses: On the expense side, our spending has reached \$159,398.55, which accounts for 65.33% of the 2023 expense budget. These expenses are essential to maintaining our church's operations and outreach efforts.

A Current Deficit

As it stands, our year-to-date financials reflect a deficit of \$7,774.16. This is a challenging position, but we have faith that, as a community, we can overcome this obstacle and ensure the continued success of our church's mission.

An Opportunity to Increase Income

One piece of promising news is that our parsonage is currently being rented, which will boost our incoming money flow. This extra income will help alleviate our current financial situation. However, we want to emphasize that your support remains invaluable. We count on your dedication to our community, not only to cover our operational expenses but also to further our ministries and outreach.

A Call to Action

We humbly extend a plea to all our members to consider offering what they can to support our church. Your contributions, both financially and through active participation in our community, are essential to maintaining the good work of our church.

As we move into the final quarter of 2023, we encourage each of you to evaluate how you can contribute to our church's financial well-being. Whether through regular tithing, additional offerings, or volunteering your time and talents, your involvement will help us continue our mission to spread love, hope, and faith within our community and beyond.
